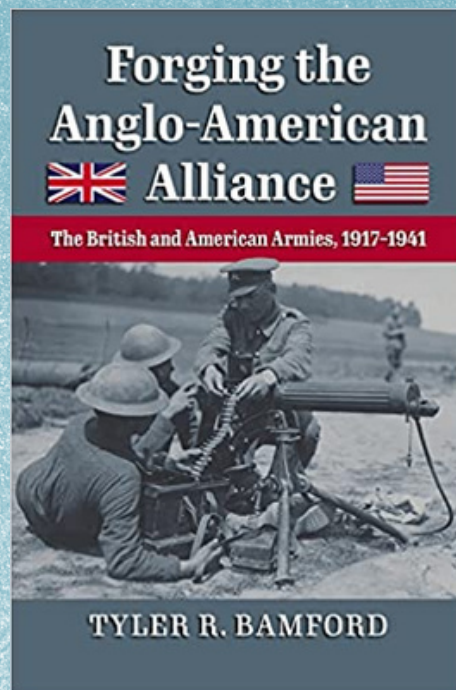

# Keynote Address

## Forging the Anglo-American Alliance: The British and American Armies, 1917-1941



**Tyler Bamford** is a historian with the Naval History and Heritage Command. He graduated with a history degree from Lafayette College in 2012 and obtained his PhD in history from Temple University in 2019. He was a 2011 recipient of a Beinecke Scholarship and was the inaugural Sherry and Alan Leventhal Research Fellow at The Institute for the Study of War and Democracy at The National WWII Museum from 2019-2021. His work has been featured in the journal *Army History* and the edited volume *Defense Engagement Since 1900: Global Lessons in Soft Power* (University Press of Kansas 2020). Dr. Bamford's first book, and the subject of his lecture this evening, is titled *Forging the Anglo-American Alliance: The British and American Armies, 1917-1941*. His book is scheduled for release this summer by the University Press of Kansas. He is currently editing the personal letters of Admiral Chester Nimitz for publication.
